From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

hat a Lent it has been, and what an even stranger Easter it is shaping up to be! Just two months ago, who could have imagined that we would not be able to gather and pray the devotions and liturgies of Lent, Holy Week and Easter due to a world-wide pandemic called COVID-19? We are confined to our homes or places of residence; we implore God's mercy for those afflicted with the virus; we support and encourage those in the medical and scientific community as they care for those who are ill and work to discover a cure and, eventually, a vaccine; we commend to the Lord the souls of those who have died; and we grieve with those who have lost loved ones.

In the Prologue of his book Rediscover Catholicism: A Spiritual Guide to Living with Passion and Purpose, author Matthew Kelly invites his readers to imagine the scenario of a strange kind of flu that has never been seen before and is suddenly claiming the lives of people as it spreads quickly from person to person, country to country. Panic strikes. Borders are closed; flights are cancelled. Doctors learn that people contract the virus and have it for a week before symptoms appear. After symptoms appear, those stricken have an unbelievable four days, and then they die. In Matthew Kelly's imaginary story, a cure is found, but they must use the blood of someone who has not been infected. A young boy's blood is found to be the perfect match. The problem is, the doctors just don't need a pint or two of blood... they need all of it. The boy's father is in an awful predicament: does he sign the medical consent form or not? Doing so will mean the loss of his only son to death, but the life of all the people in the world. What would you do if you were the boy's mother or father?

The next paragraph is striking: "The following week, they hold a ceremony to honor your son for his phenomenal contribution to humanity . . . but some people sleep through it, others don't bother to come because they

Tell What You Know

itnesses in a courtroom are always admonished to tell what they know in precise and unemthe whole truth, and nothing but the truth." Compare this to Saint Paul's championing of the "unleavened" truth in his words to the Corinthians. Nothing inflated, nothing fancy, just the flat, unadorned, and unadulterated message will do, when what we're talking about is the *gospel* truth.

Telling the truth in these terms is harder than it looks at first glance. Tell, for example, the truth about yourself, in 100 words or less. Without undue explanation, excuses, deletions, and rationalizations, that is. We discover at once that we are not very practiced at this mode of truth. Even our confessions come out studded with justifications about why we behave as badly as we do. Human beings have a built-in defense mechanism that guards the ego against attack. This includes the assault of a bad conscience, the accusation of others, or the inevitable comparisons that ensue when we encounter a truly worthy hero. Would we behave as nobly as that, given the same circumstances? We want to think so. But the unvarnished truth is, if we intended to behave that way, we would already be doing so.

Unleavened truth

eaven is generally a bad thing in the Bible.

We think of it as the happy ingredient that makes bread possible. But then we recall that in Jewish broidered terms: "the truth, practice, ritual breads were made without leaven, to remind the people of the Passover deliverance in which flat bread was all there was time for. When Jesus later warns his disciples against religious leaders whose words were beguilingly persuasive, he tells them, "Beware the leaven of the Pharisees."

> Paul seems familiar with this negative sense of leaven when he warns the vulnerable assemblies of Corinth and Galatia against the perils of bad teaching: A little goes a long way to destroy a community.

While it is true that elsewhere the kingdom of God is compared favorably to the near-magical quality of yeast to make inert dough expand with life, the most common understanding of leaven in the New Testament is its fungal ability to propagate itself once introduced. Unleavened truth then, in Paul's estimation, has not suffered the contamination of half-truths and distortions that come from outside the assembly of the faithful. He invites the Corinthians to "celebrate the feast" that is the genuine, unretouched gospel of Jesus Christ. If ever there was a feast of unleavened truth, Easter is that celebration for those who believe.

Peter tells the plain truth

ot long after the Resurrection, Peter stands before a gathering of Gentiles and tells them the gospel truth as he has come to believe it. This is 40 years before the first gospel will be written, 20 years before one word of the New Testament is set down. Peter tells a story that exists only in the memory of those who lived it. He doesn't waste time narrating how he got involved in this story or mention the towns Jesus passed through during the years of his ministry. Peter doesn't relate the number and variety of the miracles Jesus performed or recall the narrow escapes from enemies of his mission. Instead, Peter draws a straight line between Galilee and Jerusalem, between the first anointing with the Holy Spirit to the cross on which Jesus hung. He manages to describe the ministry of Jesus in two sentences, the end of his life in one, and finally conveys the good news itself in three brief but perfect ideas. In a space shorter than the Nicene Creed, Peter tells what he knows and why it matters. The response says it all. At once, the Holy Spirit descends on the group, and Peter organizes their immediate Baptism. So much for RCIA! Seriously, in my years of working directly with the process, it often occurred to me that a year is not long enough for the task of formation and

catechesis. A lifetime is better, and in fact it takes us Christians all our lives to get the hang of this thing we call faith. But the truth, the plain truth at the heart of our faith, can be described in a line or two. We are invited into a relationship with a person who will unite us with God. Jesus is the way.

The race to the tomb

eter seems so wise and collected in his encounter with Cornelius and his household. But we have to keep in mind that other Peter, running in the predawn of Easter morning along with the beloved disciple. The Peter of Easter morning doesn't know what to believe, or what to think. He has just heard terrible news, that the tomb of Jesus is empty and the body gone. Or maybe it's wonderful news. Terrible, wonderful . . . he doesn't know how to interpret these unexpected facts. He hopes that seeing for himself will produce believing and clarity. But to judge from the past three years of journeying with Jesus, seeing has never been of much assistance to Peter in promoting understanding.


And so there he stands at the scene of unvarnished truth. It's an open, empty tomb, all right. Nothing but the burial cloths and a neat placement of the face covering. No body, no real clue as to what could have happened. Sometimes the truth is too simple, and too hopeful, to be believed all at once.

On the witness stand

aster Sunday is the celebration of the great, simple, gospel truth at the center of our faith. We can express it in one marvelously short sentence: Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again! Or we can spend a lifetime writing volumes of learned theology like Thomas Aquinas, only to dismiss it in the end as an unworthy heap of words in light of the Eucharist. When it comes to the "mystery of faith," perhaps long catechisms and creedal professions only conceal what is finally a very simple thing. We have nothing to fear, not even suffering and death. Jesus is here and invites us to share his life without end.

have better things to do, and some people come with a pretentious smile and pretend to care, while other sit around and say, "This is boring!" Wouldn't you want to stand up and say, "Excuse me, I'm not sure if you are aware of it or not, but the amazing life you have, my son died so you could have that life. My son died so that you could live. He died for you. Does it mean nothing to you?"

Perhaps this is what God wants to say to all of us as the fast-paced world in which we live has ground to a halt and we are sheltering in our homes or places of residence. "My son died so that you could live. He died for you." This is the message of Easter, isn't it? The reality is we sometimes don't realize how important things are until we no longer have them. Let me be clear: God does not cause illness and disease. Illness and disease has entered the world because of that first sin of Adam and Eve: they claimed to know better than God. But God can and does use everything – even illness and disease – to bring us closer to Him.

I hope and pray that these days are being used for good... to draw closer to God and to one another, with great love, patience and mercy. With you, I long for the days when we will celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus in the Eucharist as a community of faith. Those days are coming; do not lose hope.

This Easter, may we place our hope in nothing other than the promises of the One who gave us his only Son so that we might live.

Our Lady, full of grace, pray for us!




