I Will Open My Mouth in Parables

he kingdom of heaven is like a child accompanying her mother to the mall. As the mother peruses the rack of dresses, the little girl spies a basket of cheap bangles glittering on a low table under the phosphorescent lights. "Can I have one?" the girl cries. To keep her daughter amused while she shops, the mother replies, "Yes, but only if you find one that fits." The child immediately commits herself to the task of trying on every bangle in the basket. First she extends her arm in the air and slips on a red one, followed by a purple one, and then a gold one, until there are some dozens of bracelets covering her arm from her wrist to above her elbow. Then she lowers her arm, and the row of shiny hoops slip easily over her small hand and crash into a pile on the floor. Her lips tremble with the threat of impending sobs. The bracelets are simply too large.

But she does not cry. Instead, she sits down on the carpeted floor and examines the sparkling jewelry intently for a long time. Then, taking off her shoe, she slides the bangles one by one over her foot until her leg is adorned from ankle to knee. Replacing the shoe, she stands and dances around, the metal hoops producing jangling music. "Mommy!" she cries. "They fit!"

Hidden in plain view

ollow children around for an hour and you'll witness a parable or two in them with every step. As Jesus noted, children are the natural heirs of the Kingdom and seem to have an instinct for how Kingdom reality ought to go. All it takes to enter a parable of your own is a bit of imagination, a willingness to see familiar things in a new way, and determination to achieve your prize. It could be a harvest, a pearl, or something as simple as a loaf of bread that you're after. But even in the case of a loaf of bread, it takes imagination to believe that a spoonful of yeast could make a bowl of flour rise into new and greater life.

A friend offers this parable about driving along a highway with her granddaughter in the back seat. The child had been silent for a while, and the grandmother naturally assumed she was sleeping. But suddenly, from the back seat came this mystical declaration from the little girl: "The diamonds are coming, and the rubies are going," she said. With great authority. What could it mean?

The grandmother, intent on the traffic all around her, could not give this much thought. It was a Sunday night; the six-lane freeway was a streaming sea of cars heading in both directions, all the drivers intent on getting to their respective destinations. The grandmother had to be mindful of the road. There was no time to engage her granddaughter in fanciful conversations about treasure. The diamonds may well be com-

action. They seem to invent ing and the rubies goingbut the grandmother had to keep her eyes on the road.

> And then, all at once, she saw it: the headlights streaming toward her in the three left lanes, and the taillights ahead of her in the three right lanes. The diamonds were coming, and the rubies were going. For those who had eyes to see, the night was not a tiresome ocean of relentless traffic, but a treasure to be wondered at.

We see what we believe

opular wisdom tells us that seeing is believing. But to those of faith, believing is also a way of seeing. What we believe opens our eves to the same old world in new and life-givingeven life-saving—ways.

In fact, I would go so far as to say that how we view reality is more significant than the reality we are viewing. How we interpret events—with hope or cynicism, with compassion or blame-determines the outcome of the events themselves. Do we see the mustard seed as absurdly insignificant, or do we dream of the day when it will be a tree large enough to shelter birds in its branches? How we look at social problems, or our own relationships, shapes our perspective on what has been done and can be done to heal them. Those who insist that nothing can be done will likely do nothing to solve them. Whereas those who trust that an answer exists are

much more likely to find one.

This is not to say that the Kingdom itself is a fantasy that we might dream into being with enough imagination. To say that "believing is seeing" means we acknowledge the role that attitude, intention, and will play in the story of human history. For the one who views life as a web spun around us in which we are hopelessly caught fast, there is not much incentive to struggle toward freedom. Yet human liberty is presupposed by Kingdom reality. The householder who sows good seed is free to do so, as well as the enemy who comes at night to sow weeds. The original sower has many choices to make in his response to this attack, and what he chooses—to leave the sorting for the final harvest—is crucial. If he had chosen retaliation on his enemy, or a premature uprooting, much would have been lost in his own

planting. The householder trusts the process; which is to say, God trusts divine justice and judgment. Do

Seeing with Kingdom eyes

eveloping our ability to see as God sees requires, above all, patience. It takes time for the wheat and weeds to grow toward harvest time, just as it will be a while before that mustard seed produces a tree with branches capable of harboring songbirds. Even bread cannot be coaxed to rise any faster than it does. All of the images Jesus uses speak against impulsive action. The justice of God is mixed with clemency, as the Book of Wisdom reminds us. That's a delicate mixture, and if we are not entirely sure of the components of divine judgment, we ought not to try this at home. Leave the judging to God, Jesus tells us. In the meantime, look for the diamonds and rubies all along the way.





He is the patron saint of pilgrims, laborers, rheumatism, several Latin American countries and Spain, where Santiago de Compostela has been a famous pilgrimage center since the Middle Ages. Some legends say James preached in Spain before

his death; others say his relics were transferred there. "The greater" distinguishes him from the other apostle James, "the lesser," who likely was smaller or younger.
