Knowing and Unknowing

had a friend who did everything right. Heidi kept the weight off, joined the gym, ate smart, drank little, and lived free of stress. And still she died of cancer at the age of 40. At her funeral, there was universal agreement that Heidi space and other people's shouldn't have died, that she'd earned the right to more years. Although we are born into this world with no guarantees except the certainty of death, many people felt this woman got a raw deal. Why did Joe, sitting in the third pew with his huge potbelly and three-pack-a-day cigarette habit, continue to rack up birthdays, while Heidi's children mourned her loss?

People derived different lessons from this sad event. One was to eat, drink, and be merry, and forget what the doctors say. Good stewardship of your health was foolish if cancer could still take you out at midlife. Others speculated on what Heidi must have done wrong: Did she cheat on her health regime in private? Had she lived near a nuclear reactor or done drugs in her youth? Finally there were those who felt a stricter and more extensive health program was the answer. Perhaps a totally organic vegetarian diet lived under the clear skies of New Zealand-would grant us all long and happy lives.

The truth is, nobody knows why one person lives and another dies. Sometimes it's in the genes and other times in the environment. Sometimes it's a matter of being in the wrong place at the wrong time when the

safe is falling from the third-story window. While stewardship of our bodies is a virtue, by no means does it come with guarantees. We are born into uncertainty and live subject to the forces of time and choices. Atoms dance and merge, cells multiply, and planets fly on invisible rings of gravity. We are governed by the seen and the unseen, and likewise influenced by what we've done and failed to do.

Living with uncertainty

ost of us hate the lack of control that mortality implies. So we buy insurance, build fortresses, and try to play by the rules well enough to circumvent whatever consequences we fear. How can we win a game we are born to lose?

We apply ourselves in the attempt to overrule the material forces of corruption and decay but rarely spend mon. First he calls himself much time in the acquisition of less temporal goods. Take wisdom, for example. This divine gift trumps human understanding every time, and yet more people pursue the information of our age than wisdom's timeless insights. Part of this inclination is governed by our desire for control, again: scouring the internet for a fact that might save us depends only on our initiative, while attending on wisdom means waiting for God to supply what we lack. Yet wisdom teaches us that the "paths of those on earth" are made straight by wisdom and not by the "deliberations of

mortals." Meanwhile we are too busy deliberating to hear this, and the path of history accumulates more crooks and bends.

Human understanding often fails

uman understanding **sees** things from one perspective-which is, not surprisingly, ours. Attempts at objectivity may get us up above our own idiosyncrasies but rarely much higher than those of our species. Ultimately our view suffers from the divisions that permeate our minds and hearts. We think black and white: we judge good and bad. In Saint Paul's terms, we distinguish between those in chains and those at liberty, not realizing that we are all in the chains of sin, and all offered the freedom of the children of God. Only wisdom can give us eyes to see this.

Paul does some theological sleight-of-hand in his correspondence with Philea prisoner and then claims the power to retain or to liberate Onesimus from his service. Do prisoners have the power to set free? Paul knows that Onesimus is technically a slave, but he takes him as a son—as if the distinction between a servant and a family member were negotiable. He sends the man back to Philemon as both slave and brother in the Lord. What is Philemon to do?

Paul is Philemon's teacher yet calls him a partner, erasing the obligation of obedience that a student would owe. Instead, Paul liberates Philemon to make (Continued on page 6)

his own choices. We hope that Philemon has learned to see with the eyes of faith and chooses wisely.

The debtor and the debt

esus told many stories in which justice is not served-at least, not justice by human terms. Consider the parable of the debtor whose king writes off his huge debt out of compassion. That's not right, we say. The man owes, and the man should pay! But then, something even more unjust happens: The man who was forgiven his great debt goes out and throttles another debtor for a much lower sum. That's not right either, we declare. He should show the mercy that was shown him! Finally, the original debtor is brought back before his king and handed over to torturers to pay back the whole debt that was remitted at the start of the story. Hey, we say at last: What's going on here?

of the debate. In this case, the matter of who deserves forgiveness comes out with the surprising answer: no one! Forgiveness is a gift freely and graciously given. It is not a right to be earned or a privilege denied. We can't buy or expect or demand it. At the same time, we darn well better not withhold it from others.

Bigger than boundaries

here are unknowns we know and those we don't know, as the nowfamous military quote goes. The truth is we don't even know what we think we know. That's why trust is crucial, and trust in God is the only true source of life. Mortality puts us in the cheap seats of history, and we can't see much from here. We certainly are in no position to judge, condemn, pontificate, or exclude. Best to leave the rulings to God and practice acceptance and forgiveness—in hopes of more of the same.

Like Paul with Philemon, Jesus redefines the terms
